The school continues to provide additional support for pupils with learning difficulties. There are sixteen full-time classroom assistants and five part-time classroom assistants, all of whom work with individual pupils. Strategies such as the Better Reading Partnership, Cued Spelling, Paired Reading, Homework Club, Numeracy Support Programme and Social Skills Group have also proved beneficial to students.

The staff of Omagh High School recognises that our school is very much a centre of learning. Staff keep abreast of any changes in their subject by attending relevant in-service courses that are held by the Education Authority, Examination Boards and/or various other educational establishments.

SCHOOL SECURITY

Security arrangements include:

- Staff on duty in the corridors during morning break and at the end of period 9.
- Supervisors on duty in the locker area, playground, sports courts and canteen at lunchtime.
- The building supervisor and/or his assistant on duty around the school during the working day.
- In the evening the school premises are made secure by the building supervisor and/or his assistant who check that all windows are closed, all doors locked and the intruder alarm activated.
- Signs in the entrance halls which request all visitors to report to the school office.
- On reporting to the school office, visitors are requested to sign a visitors' slip and then receive a visitor's badge which they are required to wear for the duration of their visit.
- A number of security cameras are installed internally and externally.
- Access to the school is controlled electronically.
- Perimeter fencing surrounds the school. Extra fencing has been erected between the staff car park and the upper school building.
- Additional perimeter fencing with gate access separates the school from the EA Omagh Office.

CHILD PROTECTION

The designated and deputy designated teachers for Child Protection issues were Mrs R Elkin (Principal) and Mr D Rennie respectively. Both members of staff have received training.

Child Protection awareness has been carried out for all staff and the Child Protection Policy will be reviewed and updated annually.

Child Protection records were maintained by the Principal who was responsible for Pastoral Care within the school and a separate book was also kept by the Principal. Referrals to social services were made through normal protocol by completing the UNOCINI form. The Child Protection Policy was compliant with DENI regulations and was made available to parents.

Any member of staff who has cause for concern regarding child protection refers the matter to one of the designated teachers.

EDUCATION FOR MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

Omagh High School encourages a non-denominational Christian ethos in all its activities and central to this is the willingness to accept others who differ in any number of ways for example in skin colour, religion, nationality etc.

We encourage our pupils to be inquisitive and gracious about differences and to learn from the differing views of others. This includes appreciation of other cultures, faiths and beliefs. The promotion of EMU pervades the curriculum and is specifically addressed in the Citizenship aspect of Learning for Life and Work and Religious Education.

- School Council representatives attend the Strule Shared Education Campus Omagh (SSECO) meeting along with pupils from the other 5 SSECO schools.
- Year 13 Sports Studies pupils attended fitness testing organised by the SSECO Shared Education Signature Project at the University of Ulster, Jordanstown (UUJ) along with pupils from other schools.
- Year 11 pupils attended the Youth Council Mental Health Conference/Workshop along with other local schools.
- Careers Networking Event attended by pupils.
- History students attended an exhibition of World War 1 at Omagh Library along with other local schools.
- History students attended the Holocaust Seminar in the Strule Arts Centre along with other local schools.
- Year 10 pupils attended the ‘Love for Life’ conference.
- Year 9 pupils were involved in the Queen’s Junior Academy events.
- Years 9 & 10 attended the Space Experience event at W5 Belfast along with other schools.
- A group of pupils and teaching staff took part in the ski trip to Folgaria, in the Italian Alps. The group comprised of a number of schools across the educational sector.
- Pupils participated in Victorian themed Christmas Carol Services with the collections donated to charity.
- Pupils attended a STEM Maths and Science events organised by school staff and by the Army.

SPORT/PHYSICAL ACTIVITY 2017/2018

Omagh High School continues to stress the importance of competitive and recreational sporting activities for the balanced development of all pupils. Football, Hockey, Rugby and Netball are the main focus of attention from September to March, with seasonal league and cup fixtures being played both during and after school within each age group. Football:

Under 14 Football

McMullan Shield Final - Omagh High School 2- 5 Devenish College
